- 3 The hall carpet in the education wing has been given a much needed deep cleaning. All the stains are practically gone.

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
- 4 By the time you receive this, the parking lot will have been re-striped. If not, then it soon will be!

Hymn of the Month

SING PRAISE TO GOD WHO REIGNS ABOVE -text by Johann J. Schutz, 1675

This hymn is found on page 214 of the Trinity Psalter Hymnal and is sung to a very hearty tune, Kirchengesange, which we have sung for years here at 1st Presbyterian Church, Biloxi. It is harmonized by Heinrich Reimann and translated by Frances E. Cox, 1864.

"If My people...will humble themselves, and pray and seek My face, and turn from their wicked ways, then I will ...forgive their sin...and will heal their land." You may recognize that this verse from 2 Chronicles 7:14 has been posted many times on social media lately due to the pandemic Coronavirus which has led some to murmur of despair. But years ago, this verse lead to a revival of faith, leading to the composing of this hymn. The hymn calls us to:

"Sing praise to God who reigns above, the God of all Creation, The God of power, the God of love, the God of our salvation. With healing balm my soul is filled, and every faithless murmur stilled; To God, all praise and glory!"

It was written by Johann Schutz, a friend and attorney to Philip Spener. Philip had a holy zeal to change the church from formal and shallow to one of repentance and serious discipleship. A revival broke out in the church, people were converted, lives changed, and families transformed. This revival began small group meetings, home prayer and Bible study groups. This era became known as the "Pietistic Movement." In his joy for what was happening, Schutz wrote this hymn. The third verse says:

"The Lord is never far away, But, thru all grief distressing, An ever-present help and stay, Our peace and joy and blessing. As with a mother's tender hand, He leads His own, His chosen band, To God, all praise and glory!"

In this day of social distancing and precautions against the threat of contracting a contagious disease, it is good to remember that:

"What God's almighty power hath made, His gracious mercy keeps: By morning glow or evening shade, His watchful eye ne'er sleeps. Within the kingdom of His might, Lo, all is just and all is right: To God, all praise and glory."

The story of Spener and Schutz reminds us we should never give up on revival. If you don't see a revival starting around you, let it begin in our own heart, then let it overflow to others. Let his balm fill your soul.
