Happy 130th Anniversary, FPC Biloxi

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130 years ago on May 17, 1891, representatives from the Presbytery of New Orleans met with a group of people in Biloxi in order to organize a Presbyterian Church. The moderator of that meeting was the Rev. Dr. Thomas R. Markham, the pastor of Lafayette Presbyterian Church in New Orleans. Dr. Markham pastored that church for 37 years until his death in 1894. He had served as a chaplain during the Civil War. There is an impressive monument to him in the Metairie Cemetery which says this:

"A true man and earnest patriot. A sound divine, a faithful pastor. Eloquent, persuasive, wise, generous, truthful, brave, courteous, gentle, loving. His life was a benediction and his death a triumph. To his virtues as priest and patriot, he added the loftiest qualities of the citizen. No class, no creed bounded the wide circle of his sympathies. No cause hostile to public virtue r public interest escaped his censure. No movement to advance the welfare and elevation of his people failed of his support."

The other representative from presbytery was Ruling elder John E Rodd, a prominent New Orleans merchant. Several of his children became missionaries.

There was a diverse group of fifteen adults (some children, too) who had gathered to be the charter members of the Biloxi Presbyterian Church – an elderly gentleman, a doctor, a carpenter and a bricklayer; an Irishman, a Norwegian, and a woman from Wisconsin to go along with the majority who had ties to New Orleans. The Irishman, Mr. William Henderson was elected the first ruling elder, and the doctor, William P. McMillan, was the first deacon. Services were held the third Sunday of the month in the Methodist Episcopal Church building.

The following March and May saw the reception of a number of new members, and by July 31, 1892 the little fellowship had built its own building on what is now East Howard Street. Dr. G.S. Roudebush preached the first sermon in the new building.

Dr. Roudebush agreed to be the stated supply for the Biloxi Presbyterian church in February of 1893. He was one of Mississippi's great educators. When Mississippi A&M (Now Mississippi State) was formed he was a finalist to become the first president. He lost the vote to General Stephen D. Lee, but was made the first professor of the institution, chairing the English partment. He was also instrumental in starting what is now the Mississippi University for Women in Columbus, Mississippi. In Biloxi, he worked mainly as an educator, opening a fording school for boys called Seashore Academy. He served as stated supply for the church until July 1894. The school continued under his leadership for a few more years.

In January 1895, an arrangement had been made for the Rev. N. Keff Smith to become the pastor for the Biloxi Presbyterian Church and the Ocean Springs Presbyterian Church. Rev. Smith weekly alternated Sunday morning services between the two churches. He was a hymn writer.

Controversy sprang up in May 1896 as one of the members sent a protest to presbytery asking that Rev. Smith no longer continue as pastor of the two churches. The officers of Biloxi quickly responded in defense of their pastor, and a letter approving of Dr. Smith was signed by 30 of the 40 members on the roll (the rest being absent). A commission of presbytery came to Biloxi to investigate the matter. On the commission was Dr. Benjamin Morgan Palmer, the great southern Presbyterian theologian and pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of New Orleans. Rev. Smith's call to be pastor was upheld and he continued as pastor until late 1897. The complainer was told to seek dismissal to another church.

Observation 1: the Lord provided some eminent leaders who were used by God to form our church.

Observation 2: The Lord has preserved our church through 125 years. Through the controversy in the early years, and the controversies that have come since, and even those that linger on the horizon; we can sing:

"The Church shall never perish! Her dear Lord to defend, To guide, sustain, and cherish, Is with her to the end: Though there be those who hate her, And false sons in her pale, Against both foe or traitor She ever shall prevail." (from "The Church's One Foundation")
