More Blessed to Give Than to Receive

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One person has rightfully said, "Thanksgiving, to be truly thanksgiving, is first thanks and then giving." Jesus said in Acts 20:35, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." We cannot gather, grow, or go without financial giving in tithes and offerings. Rev. Dr. R.C. Sproul of Ligonier Ministries once wrote, "When we don't tithe, we reduce the ministry of Christ. One of the greatest barriers to expanding the kingdom of Christ in this world is financial. Christian ministry depends upon Christian giving." The Lord says in Malachi 3:8, "Will man rob God? Yet you are robbing Me in your tithes and contributions." In the Mosaic law, the Lord commanded His people to tithe, to give ten percent for church governance and for the poor. But the establishment of the tithe goes even further back before the law. In Genesis 14, Abraham offered a tithe to Melchizadek. Hebrews 7 explains that tithing was practiced and honored by God long before the law of Moses. In Matthew 23:23, Jesus says, "Woe to you Pharisees, for you tithe mint and dill but neglect justice, mercy, and faithfulness. These you ought to have done without neglecting the others." In other words, Jesus does not abolish tithing but says it should not be neglected. As image bearers, our giving to the Lord reflects God's giving to us. God is the greatest giver. He gave His Son (John 3:16). In Luke 6:38, Jesus says, "Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will overflow into your lap. For with the measure you use will it be measured back to you." This illustration

is from the marketplace. The merchant of grain would press down on the grain in the container and shake it so as to create more room until the grain spilled over into the buyer's lap. God says in Malachi 3:10, "Put Me to the test. Bring to Me your tithe, and see if I do not pour down a blessing upon you until there is no more need." In other words, God says, "See if you can out-give Me. See if you can give to Me and be the poorer for it." In 2 Corinthians 9:6-7, Paul writes, "Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each should give as decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." In 1 Corinthians 16:1-2, Paul writes, "Now, concerning the collection, on the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with your income." Our giving should be in proportion to our income. Some are able to give more. Some less. In Luke 16:1-13, Jesus teaches that those who can be trusted with very little can be trusted with much. The Lord is known as Jehovah Jireh, the Great Provider. David writes in Psalm 23:5, "My cup overflows." Hymn writer Thomas Chisolm writes, "All I have needed Thy hand has provided. Great is Thy faithfulness, Lord unto me." Tithing and giving to the Lord are not financial matters but spiritual ones. The question really shouldn't be, "Should I tithe," but rather, "Why not tithe?" It isn't that 10% belongs to the Lord and the other 90% belongs to man. All 100% of our blessings belong to the Lord. Hymn writer Isaac Watts writes, "Were the whole realm of nature mine, that were a present far too small, love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all." Methodist minister John Wesley once said, "When I have any money, I get rid of it quickly lest it find a way into my heart." When it comes to honoring God with our income as obedient stewards, may we hear His words from Matthew 25:21, "Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little. Enter into the joy of your master." The apostle Paul wrote to Corinthian believers in 2 Corinthians 8:7, "But since you excel in everything, see that you also excel in the grace of giving." Let us prayerfully consider how we may honor the Lord in giving for His ministry and glory and for the preservation and advancement of the kingdom of Christ.

Establishing a Prayer Team To Share God's Heart to Reach the Lost

Cruisin'

Ocean Springs and this section of the gulf coast are known for their festivals and parties. Later this fall, the Peter Anderson Art Festival will draw close to 100,000 people to Ocean Springs (a town of less then 20,000 people). We just had a songwriters' festival here. And of course, because we are in the spiritual and cultural shadow of New Orleans, Mardi Gras is one long party all up and down the coast, running from early January until late February every year. Still, there is one event, one week here that stands out above them all. "One gathering to rule them all," if you will.....

Cruisin' the Coast, which kicks off this week and lasts for eight days. Cruising is like Christmas, your birthday, and a trip to the toy store, all rolled into one, especially for anyone who is into classic, restored, or hot rod kinds of cars. Sports cars, racing cars, antique cars, cars that shoot fire from their exhaust manifolds....They are all here. If you are into cars - Cruisin' the Coast is your Super Bowl! And that means that car enthusiasts from <u>all over the United States</u> (and beyond) will descend on the coast <u>by the thousands</u> this week. Every parking lot, empty lot, and sandlot up and down Hwy 90, which runs for miles



parallel to the beach, will be filled with car lovers as they check under the hoods and see what's inside each other's hot rods. There will be concerts, swap meets, races, and demonstrations. Celebrities will be here, like Jay Leno, who is known as a classic car collector, and who always comes to town for Cruising'. And all the while, the highway itself will be j<u>am-packed</u>, bumper to bumper, with cars that are just cruising from one end of the beach to the other, with no real destination in mind. Seriously, at Cruisin' the Coast, the point is <u>not where you are going – but that you are going there in style</u>. The whole goal is to see and be seen. And through it all, <u>image is everything</u>. With a few exceptions...



I have a friend, Ken, who brings his car to Cruisin' the Coast every year. Ken is a great guy. He has had an incredible, fascinating career, he's a blast to hang out with – and he is part of our support team for what God is doing in Ocean Springs (which means I like him extra much!). But while everyone else is flashing their ridiculously red hotrods, or their beautifully buffed restoration cars this week, cars that are meant to make others ooh and aah and take notice from a mile away....

Ken brings a **1977 Chevrolet Silverado Suburban**. Yeah, he brings a suburban to Cruisin' the Coast! Now, don't get me wrong: This is a beautiful automobile, one that Ken and his friends have spent years restoring and building out just like he wants it. It has the C10 Estate Package. It has a 454 Big Block engine. And it has front <u>and</u> rear air! Seriously, Ken and his friends have done a <u>fantastic</u> job restoring it.

But, as Ken himself told me (and I quote with permission), "It will not impress, but it suits my style: Comfortable, easy, and a bit different."

In fact, as Ken and I sat and shared a PoBoy (Fayards, Washington Street...Trust me, you'll thank me after) during Cruisin' last year, my friend said something to me that has rung in my ears ever since. As we watched (and heard) all of the bright, shiny, souped up hotrods cruise by on the strip



near us, Ken said: "Some people want the flash and the eye appeal of fancy cars. But every car has a story. And I am interested in hearing the story they have to tell." That is profound!

I pray that same desire will mark everything we do in Ocean Springs - And how we do it!

The last two months marked the one year anniversary of establishing this ministry here on the coast. It was August of '22 that I began in earnest to walk into the bars and get to know people downtown toward building a parish on Government Street – A group of non-Christians who are mine as I am theirs, and whom I am pastoring with the goal of being able to bring the gospel into their lives. And it was September of '22 that Stephanie and I held the first "come and see" meeting for a new, fledgling core group in our house. When I think back on this first year, I am <u>amazed and humbled</u> at all God has done in such a short time. And I am more convinced than ever that ministry here, **like being a missionary to a foreign culture**, must by necessity be a <u>long-term commitment</u> and process of <u>learning the language</u> and <u>building relationships</u> toward the gospel.

That goes for **both "prongs" of our ministry focus:** For <u>evangelism to the lost in the parish</u>, and for <u>discipleship to know Christ in a core group and a "church in embryo.</u>" And as we go, we must learn to see and value things that are absolutely opposite to what and how the world around us evaluates things.

This world values flashy things. Instant things. Fast things. Loud things. Image is everything, and image sells. Just look at the commercials, the instagram feeds, or the things that pop as you scroll past the ads on Facebook. We want loud, we want sizzle, and we want now. That's the way of this world. And yet, I fear, too often the church is complicit in that value system. We claim to be biblical... But we want to know "how much, how many, and how fast." We are drawn to and celebrate ministries and pastors that are loud, flashy, and attention grabbing. We value the rush and the experience, sometimes at the expense of the heart and the substance.

But that was not the way of our Savior. Look at what Jesus did: He came walking among His friends, His disciples, and the lost and broken around Him. He saw them, he heard them, and He had compassion on them. He sat with them, He ate with them, and He <u>listened to them</u>. And He began to model to them the heart of the Father for His lost and wandering children. The ministry of Jesus was not loud - It was targeted, and it was intentional. And it reverberated unto eternity like nothing else has since. And I pray that it will be <u>His ways</u>, not the world's ways, that will mark this church and this ministry.

First with a core group of Christians

This group is meeting at our house on Sunday nights. We recently completed a study of Jesus' heart for His church, as seen in Rev. 1-3, and now we are studying the Biblical theology that shows us how all of Scripture works together to reveal Jesus Christ and His gospel. Recently, a young couple in the group started bringing their guitar and leading the group in worship songs. That has been a fun, important step in our development as a "church in progress!" I am spending time starting to disciple men in the church toward growth as godly men and husbands and (Lord willing) future church leaders. And Stephanie has also started a Bible study for the ladies on Thursday nights. The Lord is bringing new people to this group, people who have moved to town or who need a church home, and along the way, we are praying and seeking that the Lord will grow a group of believers who are learning to share their lives and the hope of the gospel into and with each other....

And then with the lost all around us in Ocean Springs

We are encouraging the members of our core group to pray for and begin to look for <u>their own</u> <u>parish</u>, their own group of non-believers that God has placed within their "spheres of influence." And you know that I am focusing my efforts in the bar district of Government Street. There, I am meeting bartenders, musicians, waitresses, and patrons whose lives are adrift, broken, and lost - Because they are separated from their Creator. And as I walk with them, I am finding a group of people who are <u>desperate</u> for someone to listen to their stories. Crying out for someone who will sit with them. And amazingly open when the Lord shows me the right time to begin to speak to them of the things of God - of the gospel - and of the fact that there is indeed a Savior.

God is writing <u>His Story</u> into people's story here

With believers in the core, and with lost on the street. Fast, showy, man-centered, or man-rushed ministry on our human expectations and timelines will never work here. But the gospel.... My friends, the gospel changes everything! And evangelism is about going....and sitting....and listening. Because... the heart of God is the heart of a Father running toward lost children. And through His Son, He came to bring reconciliation and hope – Hope for the lost <u>and</u> hope for the church.

It is not flashy. It is not loud. Often, it is not even visible. But it is Biblical. And it is powerful. And it is the one thing that can really change lives for eternity. My friends, will you pray that we will listen well. That we will **disciple believers in the gospel**, and then **bring that same gospel to lost people**...not just with the <u>message of Jesus</u>....but with the <u>manner of Jesus!</u>
